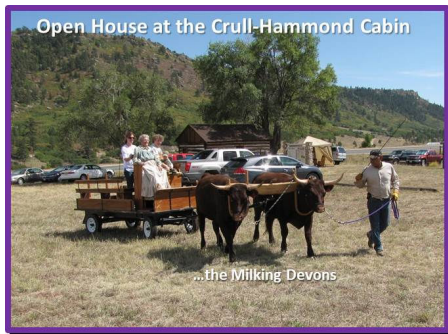

Also on that Saturday in September,

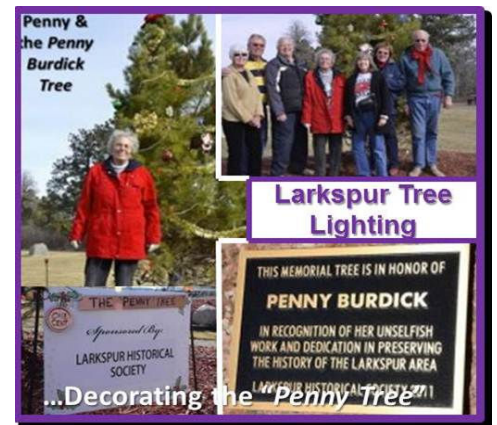

Larry Schlupp, Bob Liese, Barbara Darden of SCHEUBER AND DARDEN ASSOCIATES, and whoever else you wish to name are working on securing a grant from the State Historic Fund (SHF) for the Greenland Post Office. LHS has applied twice for this grant money in 2012. We have been denied on both applications primarily because of the preservation dollars of the SHF used for the Capitol Dome Restoration. Many of the LHS meetings in 2012 held discussions about ways the Society could raise substantial funds to help DOUGLAS COUNTY OPEN SPACE defray costs of this substantial project.

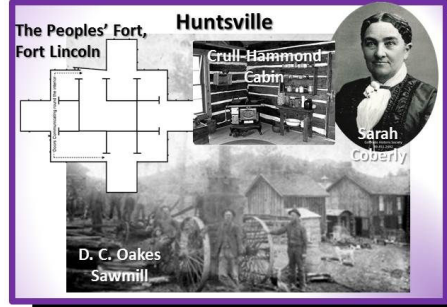


The building was stabilized in November through the efforts of Larry and Judy Hammer, Administrator of DOUGLAS COUNTY COMMUNITY PLANNING AND SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT.

LHS feels the Greenland area is a pivotal piece of our historic history. Bonnie Bell requested of Douglas County resident, Rick Taylor items from his Mother's estate pertaining to the Greenland Post Office. Rick has been

a good steward of Dorothy's post office pieces.

The old Huntsville site, YOGI BEAR JELLYSTONE PARK CAMP-RESORT, saw a lot of work in 2012. Larry puts together various archeological crews in "digging Huntsville." This area is revealing new things of great interest – people from the East Coast sharing stories of



their fore-bearers in Douglas County, new photographs, areas revealed thanks to the work of resident goats. Crew members are using metal detectors and finding artifacts. The *Peoples' Fort* and the *Coberly Hotel* are being considered for rebuild by the ownership of JELLYSTONE PARK.

EXTENDING HISTORICAL KNOWLEDGE

LHS applied for and received a grant from the PHILIP S. MILLER FOUNDATION to cover expenses associated with the rebuild of our society website. The new website will be coming on line in 2013.
